

From Pastor Jean

The Church year is turning to Lent, March 5 is Ash Wednesday. In the Protestant church, this day has often been ignored - it's a Roman Catholic tradition, right? Well, it is but its roots go back to the early church long before there were any such divisions. These forty days (excluding Sundays) have been a time of reflection and often thought of as a somber and humorless time. After all, we begin with Ash Wednesday (see below for the Community Ash Wednesday service at Pocket) and its call to penitence with the stark reminder that we too, are made up of dust and one day will return to it. The predominant color is purple, reminding us of Christ's suffering. We often talk about what we will give up - chocolate is a common favorite. To our ears, the music sounds very somber, even when it's not. We cannot forget - nor should we - that Good Friday will follow the ebullient cheers of Palm Sunday and, with it, Christ's suffering for you and me. Yet with believers of all times and all places, we know that Good Friday was not the end but a brief pause before the glorious Easter Son-rise.

Well then, how should we approach Lent? Perhaps this is the time to focus on our faith more intentionally. We have a new bible study (see below) beginning on Ash Wednesday and going through the first week of Easter. Perhaps you would prefer a Lenten devotional for your daily study. It just so happens that the author of our Bible study has one. Check out https://katebowler.com/ and look for "The Hardest Part" devotional. While you do have to sign up there is no cost and you then can download the full devotional booklet. Or if you wish to give something up that's fine but what will you replace it with? For example, if you give up chocolate you might wish to take the money you save and contribute it to One Great Hour of Sharing or to the local food bank or other mission. Perhaps you have decided to read your Bible every day. Wonderful! Write it on your calendar so you don't forget. Oh, and if you miss a day it's okay to either catch up or just start again. Maybe you've decided to increase your prayer life. Fantastic! Make a note of those who you feel called to pray for when it strikes you (it's ok to wait until you get to a stop sign - no writing nor texting while you drive please. Better yet offer that prayer right then with your eyes wide open!) Or maybe it's something completely different, unique just to you. That's great! Take this time to deepen your walk with your Lord and Saviour.

I encourage you to also join in one of the special events and invite a friend.

We are all called to grow in our Christian walk, maturing in our faith. What will you do to follow our Saviour more closely as we journey together this Lenten season?

The Legend of St. Patrick's Day



St. Patrick's Day is officially observed on March 17 each year, though celebrations may not be limited to this date. The significance of March 17 is that it's said to be the date of St. Patrick's death in the late 5th century (circa A.D. 493).

Saint Patrick is the patron saint and national apostle of Ireland. He is credited with successfully spreading Christianity throughout Ireland—hence the Christian celebration of his life and name.

The man who would eventually become St. Patrick was born in Britain (part of the Roman Empire at the time) as Maewyn Succat in the late 4th century. His family was Christian, but it's said that Maewyn himself was an atheist throughout his childhood.

That would change at age 16 (around A.D. 400) when Maewyn was kidnapped from his home on the west coast of Britain by Irish pirates, who proceeded to carry him off to Ireland and force him to work as a shepherd herding sheep. After six years, he escaped his captors, walking nearly 200 miles through the Irish landscape and convincing a ship to carry him with them back to Britain. This harrowing experience certainly had an effect on Maewyn, who was convinced it was the Lord who protected him and delivered him safely home.

Upon returning home, Maewyn received his call (in a dream) to preach the Gospel—in Ireland, of all places! He spent the next 15 or so years in a monastery in Britain, preparing for his missionary work. When he became a priest, his name was changed to Patricius, and he returned to the land of his captors to begin his teachings.

Although some Christians already lived in Ireland at the time, the country was largely pagan, so spreading a foreign religion was not an easy task. Patricius traveled from village to village to share the teachings of the Lord and was eventually successful enough to found many churches there.

We wear a shamrock on St. Patrick's Day because, legend says, St. Patrick used its three leaves to explain the Holy Trinity in his teachings. (The Trinity is the Father, the Son, and the Spirit as three divine persons who are one divine being [God].) The truth of the St. Patrick legend, however, is in question, as there is no direct record that the saint actually used the shamrock as a teaching tool.

Note: The symbol of St. Patrick is a three-leaf shamrock, not a four-leaf clover. However, long before the shamrock became associated with St. Patrick's Day, the four-leaf clover was regarded by ancient Celts as a charm against evil spirits. In the early 1900s, O. H. Benson, an lowa school superintendent, came up with the idea of using a clover as the emblem for a newly founded agricultural club for children in his area. In 1911, the four-leaf clover was chosen as the emblem for the national club program, later named 4-H.
